

Wednesday To be To have, have got Remember! I am a boy. You are a girl. He is a man. She is a woman. It is Remember! When the verb to have expresses possession it can be replaced by a thing/an animal/ an object. We are boys. You are girls. They are men/ the verb to have got. women/things/animals/birds. The interrogative of the verb to have is formed by inversion — have (I, you, we, they) has (he, she, it), or by the help of the verb to do - do (I, you, we) have, does (he, she, it) have. The interrogative of the verb to have got is formed only I. Answer the questions following the example: Are you a teacher, Mrs. Bobbins? The negative of the verb to have is formed either by simply adding not after the verb or by the help of the verb to do -I have not/haven't or I do not/ don't have The negative of the verb to have got is formed by adding not after have -I have not/haven't got a.
